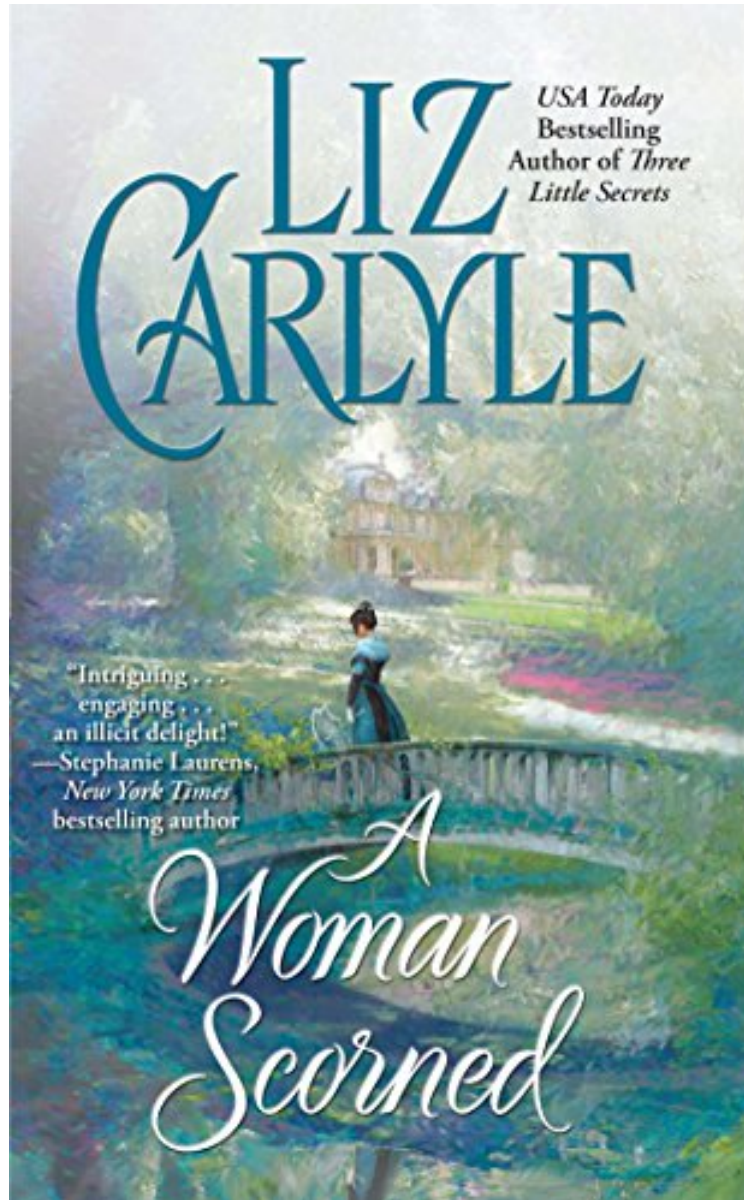

Hot! Hot! Von ShawnaLanne *A Woman Scorned* was one of those rare Regency romance novels with a heroine who is as powerful as the hero. I loved it. The heroine, Jonet, is the one with the powerful title, loads of money and hoards of admirer's before her 'fall'. The hero, Cole, while masculine and sexy is definitely the more naive and not as socially prominent of the two. Jonet Rowland is living under a cloud of suspicion after the mysterious death of her philandering husband. Her beauty, her power and her unrepentant relationship with a wild young lord (not Cole) all make her appear to be a heartless hussy. Enter Captain Cole Amherst, a soldier who has the heart of a Curate, and the body of a God. He is sent to watch over the lovely Jonet and her two sons by their scheming Uncle as their tutor. In the midst of their personal problems are several 'accidents' that threaten the life of Jonet and her sons. *A Woman Scorned* has a strong plot, some emotional depth, although it could use a bit more characterization, and some really great sex scenes. One in particular is wonderful. Jonet has a strong managing personality and throughout most of the book initiates and directs her and Cole's sexual encounters. Cole finally has enough and ties her up and has his 'wicked way with her'. Liz Carlyle manages to keep this scene from being a degradation of Jonet by inserting humor into the scene and having Cole stop to make sure she was all right with it before proceeding. Carlyle pulls no punches while her protagonists examine their own emotions, and the characters are honest in their needs. I do think the sex scenes have been misunderstood by the reviewers who were offended by them. Cole and Jonet engage in some very active loveplay, and at one point, as Jonet is trying to help Cole exorcise painful memories, they indulge in some passionate bondage, but it is never degrading. At all points, the question of domination does not control. While Cole claims he is going to do what HE wants to Jonet, and states he wants her to "learn a little obedience", this worrisome dialog is countered by his complete failure to keep a straight face a few paragraphs later, when he can't help but laugh as he says "At least-- at least once in a while... Oh bloody hell, ... Who am I kidding?" They give and take pleasure as equals, and it is ALWAYS threaded through with something more, something deeper than the lust they both readily admit they feel. I DID find it easy to believe these two LOVED each other, because they were the answer to each other's deepest emotional needs. And while Jonet's behavior was often shrewish, it was well-explained by the edge upon which she teetered. Her remorse afterward, and her scenes of touching care and kindness more than made up for her tantrums. I read voraciously, and fell in love with this book, and these characters. What a delight to find a writer that creates a strong heroine and not another "shrinking violet" that must depend on a man for survival! Yes, Jonet Rowland desires Cole Amherst, both him and his assistance (though a hesitantly at first on both counts), but it is nice to see a purposeful, intelligent leading lady with real-life responsibilities. How tiring are the "virginial flower" dependent on the whim of a man one so often encounters in romance novels. Women today are strong, independent, and empowered and need heroines with whom they can identify. I know I lose patience with "needy" female leading characters offered in some romance stories, but that certainly is not the case here! In the same vein, woman today are comfortable with their sexuality and it is nice to see that reflected in a book, as well. And while everyone has their own particular preference, Ms. Carlyle handles Jonet's sexuality realistically, yet tastefully. Intimacy in this book is healthy imaginative, not the general "breathy fluff" that is offered up. REAL women like REAL sex.
